



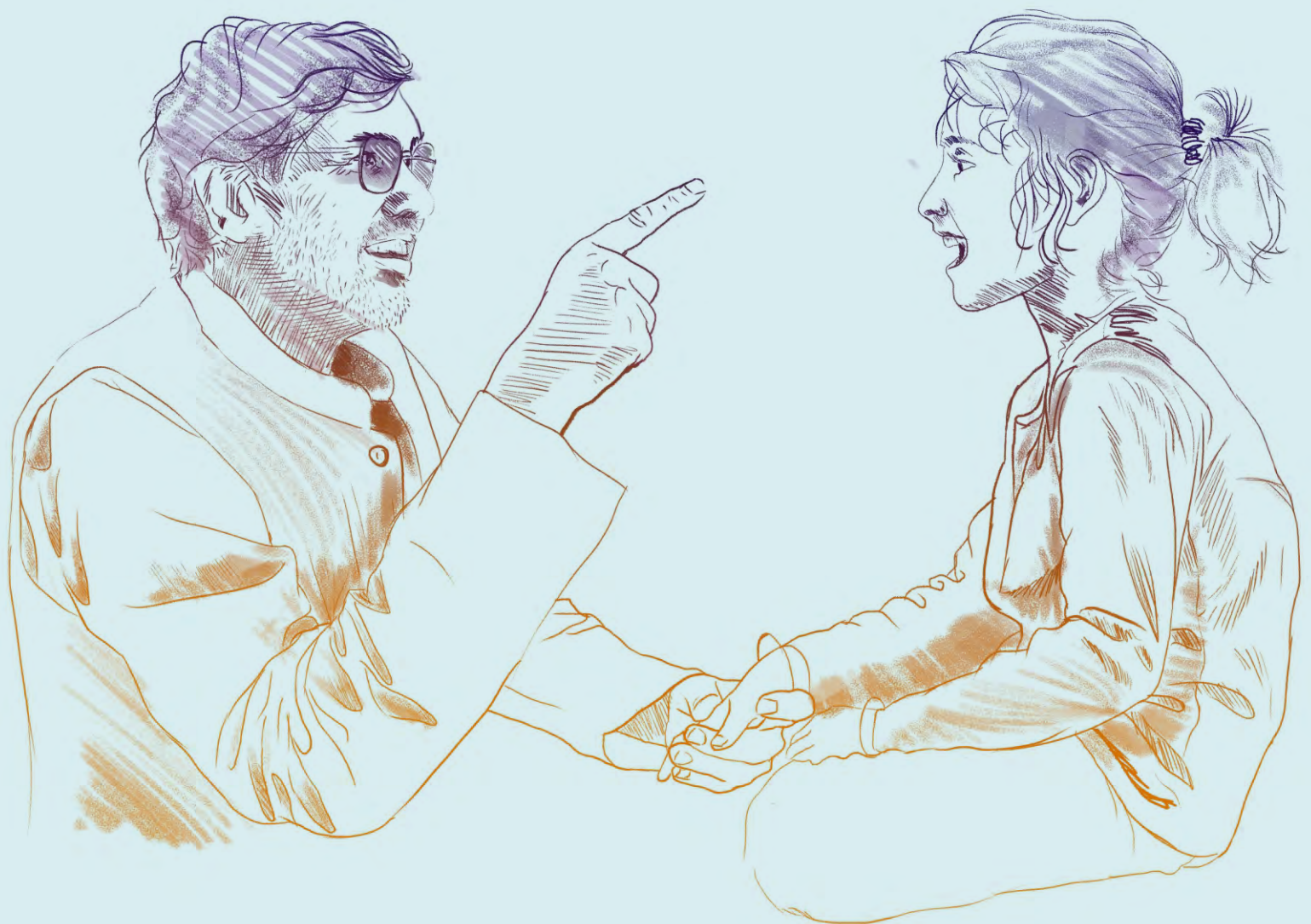

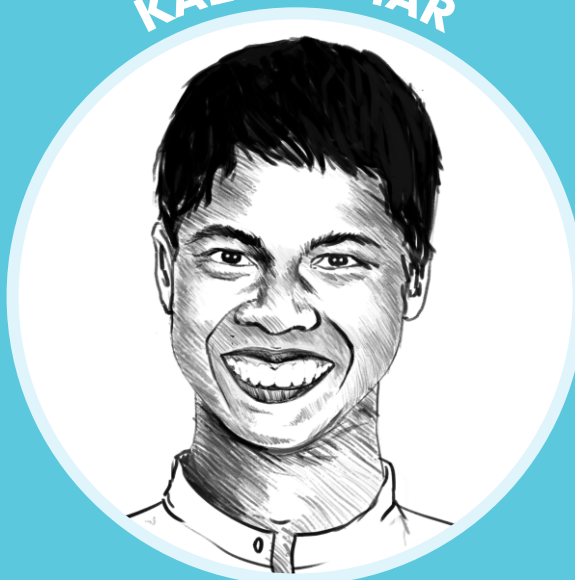

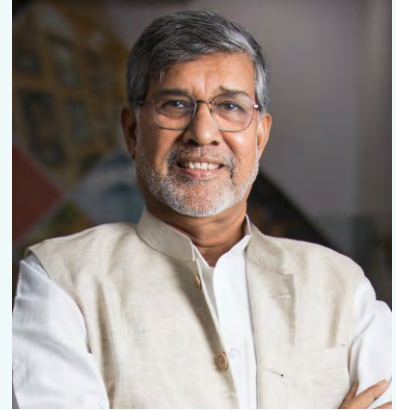

MESSAGE FROM THE **FOUNDER**

Dear friends and colleagues,

The year 2020-21 was indeed one of the most challenging years for the world. COVID-19 has had a devastating effect on lives and livelihoods, undermining years of progress. Through it all, our children have suffered the most. The pandemic resulted in the long-term closure of schools, and loss of livelihood of primary caregivers, leaving several families including children in a highly vulnerable state, making them prone to being trafficked and forced into labour.



During these difficult times, we brought to the Government's attention, children trapped in industries and factories as child labourers. BBA along with its partners rescued more than 9000 children from labour, slavery and trafficking.

With the onset of the pandemic and disruption of the economy, the world was forced to reinvent and adapt to the 'new normal'. When people moved to work from the comforts of their homes, even the deadly nature of the virus could not contain the zeal of BBA activists who worked tirelessly to further our cause. With complete disregard for their own safety and wellbeing, they relentlessly rescued children from being exploited while also distributing food, medical and humanitarian relief to the ones most in need.

We brought to the forefront, the issue of children, who had lost either or both of their parents during the pandemic. Several state governments and the central government understood the severity of the situation and announced immediate support to these children. Along with our partners, we distributed dry rations to over 4.9 million individuals and provided protective gear to over 19,000 frontline workers across the country.

To ensure the prevention of children from being trafficked and the protection of children living in childcare institutions from the spread of the virus, BBA filed several PILs in Supreme Court resulting in landmark judgments. Furthermore, by organizing national and international online webinars, training and seminars, BBA continued to spread awareness, highlighting the need to address the issues of child protection, while also building partnerships to strengthen our on-ground reach.

I take immense pride in our achievements and how we dealt with the challenges thrown at us this year. The obstacles we braved will serve as stepping stones for future learning. As the years pass by and new challenges continue to emerge, I along with my colleagues and partners, endeavor to achieve our goal of a child friendly world where all children are free from exploitation and abuse.

ABOUT **BACHPAN BACHAO ANDOLAN** (BBA)

BBA is a frontline anti-trafficking and anti-slavery grassroots movement in India. With the vision of creating a child-friendly society, Nobel Peace Laureate Kailash Satyarthi founded BBA in 1980. Its core activities are run and managed through the registered society **“Association for Voluntary Action”** (AVA). The liberating and humanising philosophy of the movement continues to remain central to its activism against all forms of violation of child rights. Apart from engendering a child-centric perspective among the government functionaries, elected representatives and civil society groups, BBA has played a decisive role in shaping various legislative enactments and policy initiatives concerning children in India. BBA works relentlessly across 20 states to ensure the well-being and safety of children.

BBA has been placed as a primary resource organisation in sensitisation of decision makers, judicial, quasi-judicial bodies and other stakeholders working against trafficking and slavery, especially in India and South Asian Region.

BBA's efforts have been acknowledged from time to time by various national and international agencies. Furthermore, Credibility Alliance has accredited the organisation on achieving desirable norms in Governance of NGOs.

BBA has so far been instrumental in the protection and rehabilitation of over 1, 02,500 children.

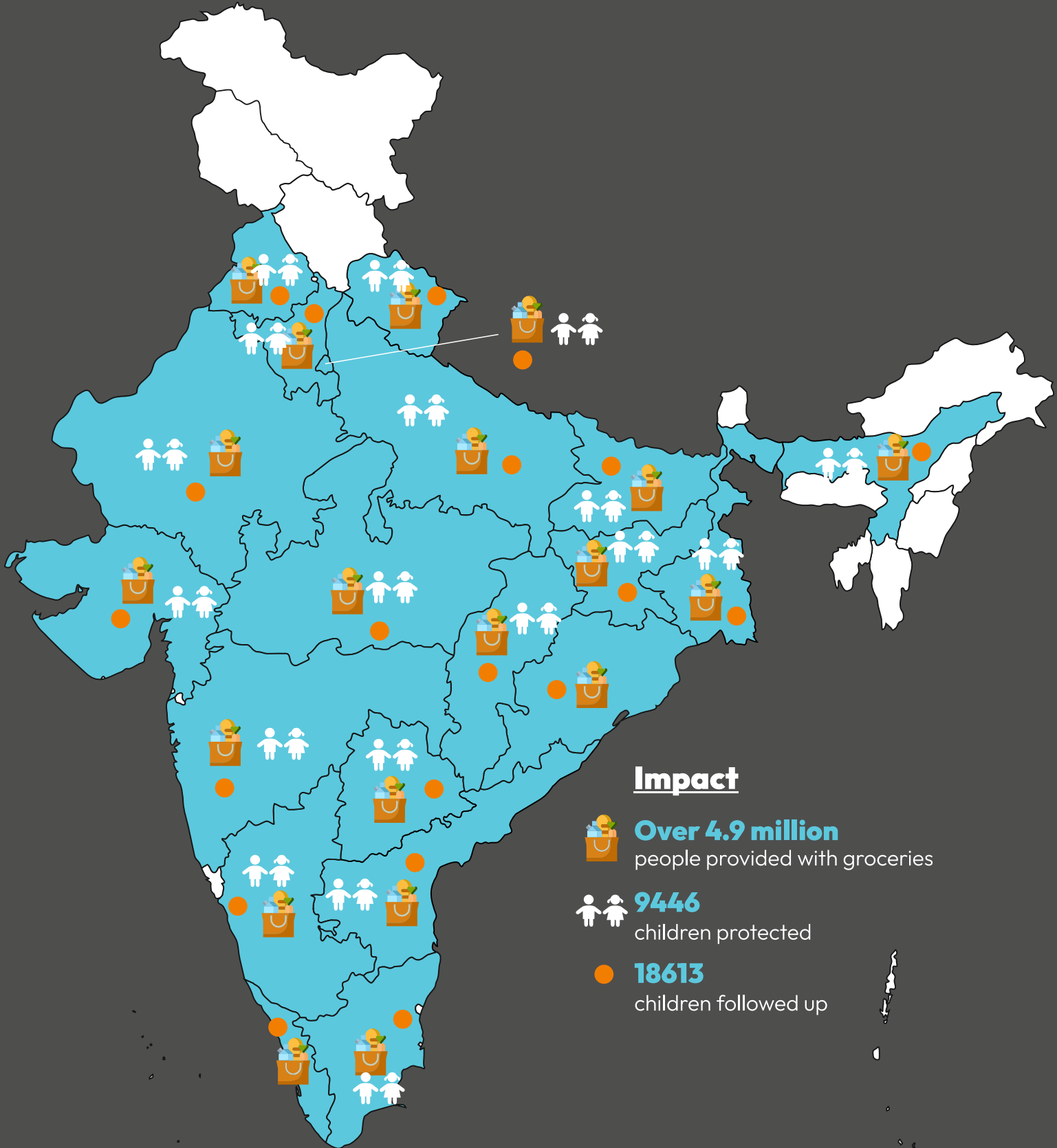

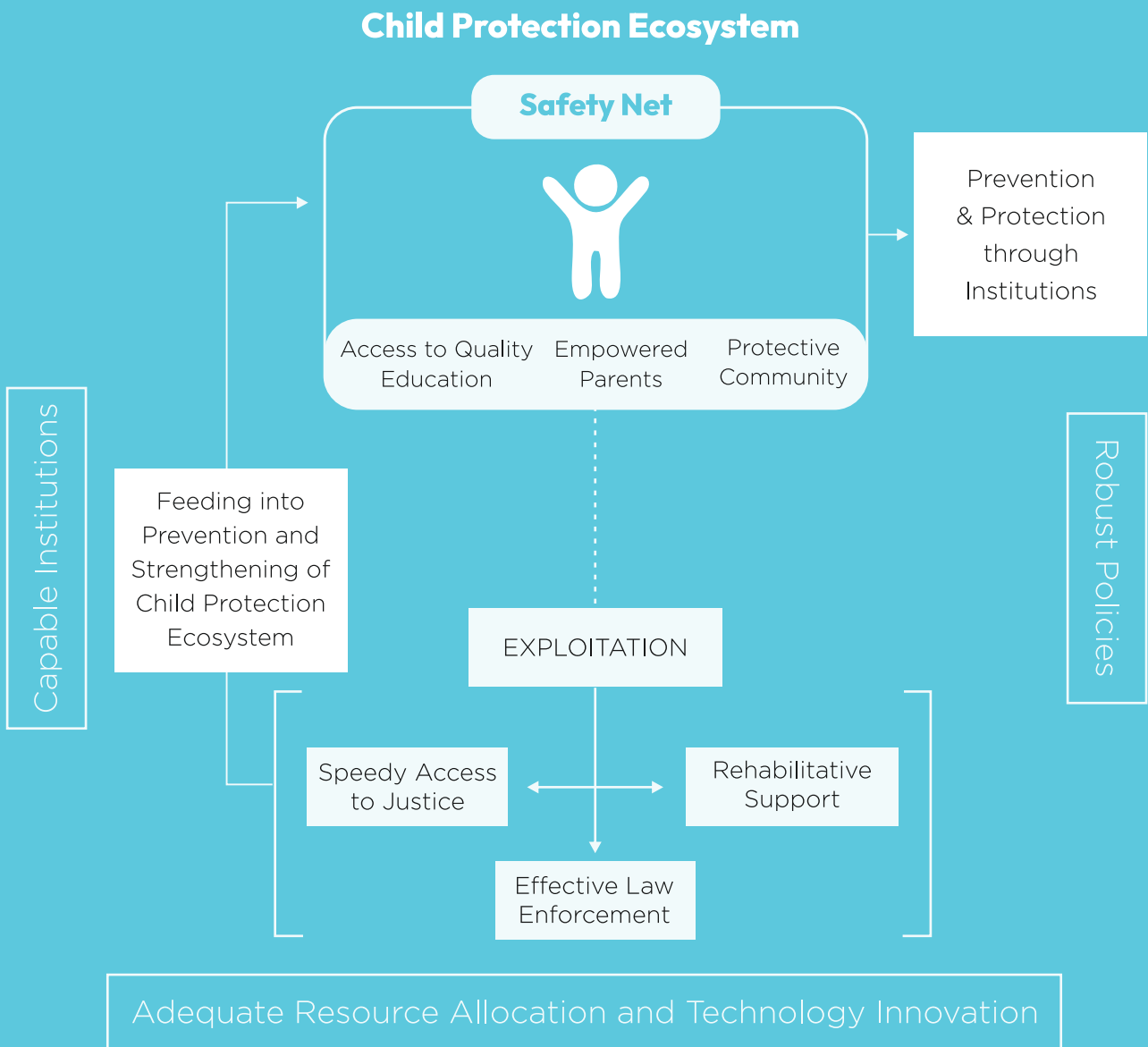

BBA's BLUEPRINT FOR CHANGE

BBA's blueprint has been developed and strengthened through the four-decade long on-ground experience; it is based on the belief that in order to have sustained impact, work must be focused on preventing trafficking, prosecuting traffickers and protecting victims. The prevention of exploitation of children is ensured through access to education, empowered parents and a protective and responsive community thereby creating a safety net around them. If a child is still exploited, BBA seeks to ensure a robust framework for rehabilitation that ensures psychological, economic and social rehabilitation and reintegration into mainstream society.

BBA seeks to create a deterrence for crimes against children by enabling an effective and responsive law enforcement machinery and a speedy and child-friendly justice delivery mechanism. On one hand, it seeks to create a society which is compassionate towards the needs of an exploited child and on the other, deters the perpetrator and enforces behaviour change, which together feed into prevention of exploitation.



PROGRAMME

VICTIM ASSISTANCE

The Victim Assistance programme is BBA’s flagship programme that encompasses a comprehensive and transformative approach to child protection and rehabilitation. It has created an end to end mechanism to provide protection, support and rehabilitation to children for ensuring their safety, well-being and reintegration into the community. BBA began its journey with this Programme in 1980 when Nobel Peace Laureate Kailash Satyarthi rescued a minor girl “Sabo” who was about to be sold into prostitution, along with 35 others involved in generational bonded labour from a brick kiln in Punjab. The learnings and experience gained from the programme have contributed immensely in reforming and reshaping the legal and institutional mechanism of child protection in the country.

The pandemic and the subsequent nationwide lockdown slowed down the entire process of identifying, rescuing and rehabilitating child victims of trafficking and labour. However, the programme was quick to adapt and mould its strategies to cope with the challenges and ensure maximised reach to the vulnerable children. Even post lockdown; since all Government officials were engaged in managing Covid-19 relief, diverting their attention towards child protection cases required extensive deliberations and persuasions by BBA activists. BBA leveraged its partnerships with the stakeholders and through constant engagement ensured that issues of child protection receive due diligence by the authorities.

‘A stitch in time saves 16 from exploitation’

- Successful interception of a bus transporting children to work at a bangle making factory in Jaipur

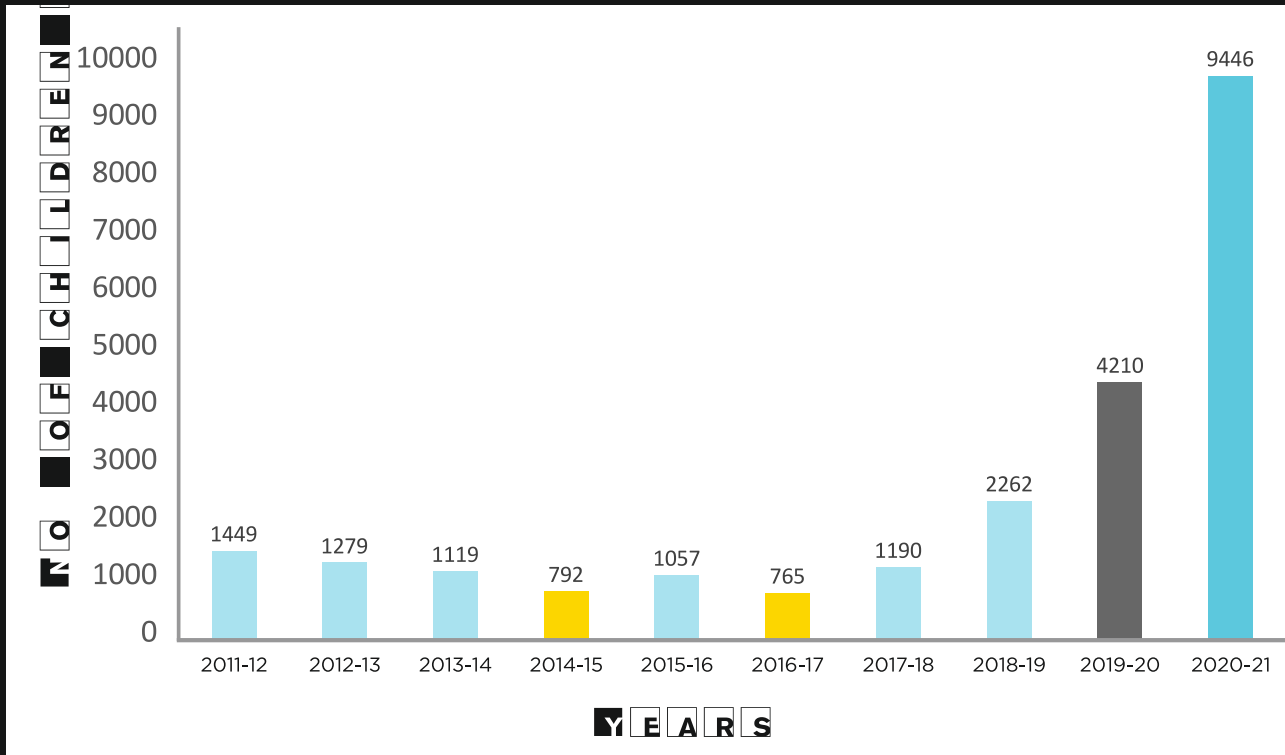
Post easing of the lockdown restrictions, BBA increased its vigil at bus stops and railway stations to intercept the commonly used mode of transportation by traffickers. During one such interception in Rajasthan, on 28 September 2020, BBA along with the AHTU and the local police rescued 16 children from a bus. They were being transported via a bus numbered RJ13PA4629. On inquiry, it was found that the bus driver had concealed the number plate of the vehicle by putting a black tape, indicating active involvement of driver in the trafficking nexus. The children were being trafficked to work in Bhatta Basti, infamous for employing children in its bangle factories.

During this rescue operation, five accused including three traffickers, a driver and a helper were arrested. The bus carrying children was also seized on the spot. Post general medical check-up and Covid-19 test, children were sent to a quarantine centre on the orders of CWC. An FIR was lodged under Sections 370(5), 120-B, 34 of IPC, 1860, Section 75 of JJ Act, 2015 and Section 39/192 of the Motor Vehicles Act, 1988.

Interceptions like these managed to arrest not only traffickers but also create deterrence in the trafficking nexus.

BBA Helpline

BBA helpline aims to provide comprehensive time-bound support to children and their families. The helpline acts as the first contact point and enables the victim and his/her family to access legal support and counselling services.

Rising to the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, BBA's strategy to prevent human trafficking and child labour involved a focused action plan and coordination between the state and the central team. This involved associates who received complaints, provided counselling services and shared the information received from the helpline to the ground team present in the states. Thereafter, BBA state associates contacted stakeholders/duty bearers and took action on the ground as per the nature of the offence.

During the reporting period, 454 complaints were received and addressed. A summary of the nature of complaints is as follows:

REHABILITATION CENTRE

Post rescue, children are sent to Child Care Institutions (CCI) for immediate care and protection on the orders of Child Welfare Committees (CWC). These CCIs are managed by Government/ NGOs and are governed by the Juvenile Justice Rules, 2016.

MUKTI ASHRAM: SHORT TERM REHABILITATION CENTRE FOR BOYS

Mukti Ashram is a short term rehabilitation center, set up on the outskirts of Delhi for the care and protection of survivors of trafficking and labour. Post withdrawal from any exploitative situation, children are placed in Mukti Ashram on the orders of CWC until being repatriated with parents or legal guardians.

During their stay in Mukti Ashram, children are provided with legal assistance, medical care and psychological, emotional support besides learning and recreational opportunities. Children are also supported in the post-rescue processes including production before CWC for repatriation, recording of their statements and opening of bank accounts for receipt of back wages and compensation.

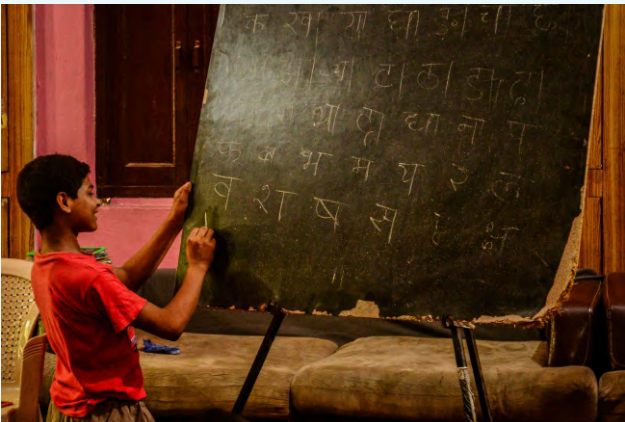
As the pandemic called for distinct measures, changes were adopted accordingly in the post-rescue processes. Apart from their general medical check- up, conducting a Covid-19 test was also the need of the hour. However, during the post-rescue processes, it was noticed that children were compelled to be physically present before the Magistrate for recording of statement, also they were being taken to hospitals to get their covid-19 tests done, increasing their vulnerability to contract the virus. Hence, in order to ensure the protection of children against COVID- 19, a PIL was filed by BBA in the Delhi High Court, which resulted in the landmark judgement.

As a result of the PIL, Metropolitan Magistrates of different courts visited Mukti Ashram to facilitate recording of statements of children under 164 CrPC. CWC members also visited the Ashram for recording statements of the children and to conduct regular quality and maintenance checks, to ensure that the COVID- 19 protocols were followed.

During the year, **185 children** were provided immediate care and protection at Mukti Ashram and all of them were reunited with their families.



MUKTI ASHRAM AT A GLANCE



“Rescued Child becomes a Change Agent ”

Journey of a 16 year old child from exploitation to becoming a change agent is an inspirational story of transformation aided through the child-friendly curriculum of Mukti Ashram.

Shyam (name changed) was trafficked from Dube Tola village of Sitamarhi district in December 2019. The trafficker, who belonged to a nearby village managed to convince the family of a better life for Shyam in Delhi. He paid an advance of INR 20,000 to the family and took him along to work in a garment factory in South West district of Delhi, where he was forced to work without any leave and was exploited.

He was rescued by BBA in June 2020 and was declared a bonded labourer. He was not paid anything during the 8 months that he worked in the factory. Post rescue, he was sent to Mukti Ashram on the orders of the CWC.

The child-friendly environment at the Ashram had a positive effect on the child. Shyam stayed in the Ashram for over 3 months where he was provided with counselling support that helped him recover from his past traumatic experiences. With time, he also showed interest in age-appropriate Non-Formal Education and participated in the Social Education sessions held at the Ashram to impart knowledge on child rights.

BBA supported the issuance of his Release Certificate and post repatriation, his enrolment in school was also facilitated. Further, he was also encouraged to be a member of the children’s group in his village. Soon Shyam became an integral and active member of that group. He mobilised his peers to complete their education and prevent themselves from getting exploited. Shyam has also acted as an “informer” at times by reporting instances of child exploitation in his village. Currently, a student of class 8, Shyam aims to study further to prevent other children from being exploited.



TOWARDS A CHILD FRIENDLY ENVIRONMENT

– SAFEGUARDING CHILDREN IN THEIR HOMES

BBA ensures protection, prevention and rehabilitation of rescued children through formation of child protection mechanisms in the villages and generating awareness in the community.

A. Creation of PVCs and Children's groups

Four Children's Groups and PVCs were constituted in Sitamarhi district of Bihar post relaxations in restrictions and reopening of schools. Sessions on issues related to child rights, child labour and child trafficking were held to empower children and enable them to protect themselves from exploitation. Furthermore, as the school dropout rate increased during the pandemic, BBA also stressed on the importance of education in preventing exploitation. With the help of the PVCs and children's groups, one child marriage was stopped and 51 out-of-school children were enrolled back in schools.

बचपन बचाओ आंदोलन की पहल पर 51 बच्चों का नामांकन

सीतामढ़ी/परिहार-प्रखंड क्षेत्र के दुबे टोला के चांदपुरा गांव में बचपन बचाओ आंदोलन द्वारा पूर्व में इन गांवों के 10 बच्चों को बालश्रम से मुक्त कराया गया था, जिसके बाद बाल संरक्षण समिति बना कर गांव में बच्चों की शिक्षा और सुरक्षा को लेकर बचपन बचाओ आंदोलन द्वारा एक व्यापक कार्ययोजना की जा रही है। जिसका नतीजा दिखने को मिल रहा है जिससे तहत बच्चों को चिन्हित कर स्कूल में नामांकन करवाया गया है। बचपन बचाओ आंदोलन के मुकुंद कुमार चौधरी ने कहा कि बचपन बचाओ आंदोलन ने ग्रामीण, बाल समिति एवं गठित बाल संरक्षण समिति, स्वयं सहायता समूह के साथ पूर्व से ही बच्चों के नामांकन को लेकर लगातार बैठक कर लोगों को जागरूक करने का काम



कर रही है। जिसके तहत गांव के अनामिकित बच्चों को चिन्हित कर इस सत्र में 51 बच्चों का नामांकन स्कूल में हो रहा है। बचपन बचाओ आंदोलन कोरोना महामारी के कारण बच्चे विद्यालय से ड्रॉपआउट ना हो इसके लिए भी योजनाबद्ध तरीके से लोगों को

B. AWARENESS GENERATION

- A five-day awareness generation programme was organised in the villages of Sitamarhi district of Bihar. The objective of these programmes were to equip the community, especially the primary caregivers with knowledge of issues related to child labour, child marriage and child trafficking. Moreover, BBA undertook the activity of painting slogans on the walls of the villages to sensitise people on issues of child protection and child rights.
- In order to prevent children from dropping out of schools and motivate them to continue their education, BBA organised an event in four villages of Sitamarhi district of Bihar where BBA distributed school bags to 188 children. The children identified were primarily from families facing financial distress, rescued children or children of single parents. Through this event, the importance of vigilance at the community level was highlighted. All community members were mobilised to take up responsibilities for ensuring the protection of the children and make their village child- labour free
- BBA organised a cycle rally to raise awareness about child trafficking, child labour and child rights. Officials of District Administration, DCPU and CWC flagged off the rally from Dumra Block in Sitamarhi district. Notably, many police officials came forward in this rally to distribute stationery amongst the participating children. Approximately 60 children and 10 officials participated in the rally.



LEGAL INTERVENTIONS

Judicial interventions are strategic tools to pave the path for a child-friendly society. BBA facilitates easy access to justice through petitions and provides legal representation to victims. The role of the organisation in improving the existing legislations and development of child centric policies is duly recognised in the country.

Covid-19 pandemic hit all the sectors of the economy, including courts and legal proceedings. While the other sectors were quick to adapt to virtual mode of functioning, arranging the system to facilitate online mode of hearing of cases took a while.

Public Interest Litigations

Post relaxation in restrictions, the risk of trafficking of children had increased multi-fold . To counter the same, BBA took assistance of the Apex Court and filed two PILs for prevention and protection of children from trafficking.

- a. A PIL was filed requesting the NDMA to formulate an action plan to combat trafficking during the pandemic.
- b. A PIL was filed to:
 - Preserve the migrant data
 - Segregate the migrant data with regard to children
 - Share data with SCPCRs, CWCs, and AHTUs of respective states for identification, rehabilitation and protection of trafficked children.

In response to the PIL, in the month of July 2020, MHA issued an advisory titled **“Preventing and Combatting Human Trafficking especially during the period of COVID-19 Pandemic”**.

PILs filed in High Courts for protection of children and strengthening child protection mechanisms

- a. A PIL was filed in Hon’ble Delhi High Court for ensuring relief and protection against Covid-19 to rescued children placed in CCI, wherein bench gave the following directions:
 - Recording of statements of children under section 164 of CrPC, 1973 to be done by the Magistrate visiting CCI or through video conferencing.
 - Any legal proceedings under JJ Act, 2015 and other statutes to be held over video conferencing and where necessary by visiting the CCI.
 - Covid-19 sample of the child to be collected by health officers visiting CCI instead of children being taken to health centres.
- b. The Hon’ble High Court of Karnataka passed the following orders in the matter Bachpan Bachao Andolan vs. State of Karnataka for efficient implementation of provisions of JJ Act, 2015:
 - Social audit of the implementation of the provisions of the JJ Act is contemplated to be undertaken by the State Commission.
 - Formulation of guidelines for child protection and for dealing with the issue of child pornography.
 - Framing of JJ State Rules and SOP for inquiry in Missing Children
 - Filling of all vacancies in CWC, JJB and SCPCR.
 - Constitution of SJPU in all districts.

- c. Two PILs were filed at Tamil Nadu and Uttarakhand High Courts for strengthening the child protection mechanisms.

Other Judicial Interventions

1. Filed two Criminal Appeals and one Habeas Corpus petition at Hon'ble Delhi High Court
2. The Hon'ble High Court of Delhi was assisted by BBA in the capacity of Amicus Curaie in several human rights violation matters. In two such matters, the intervention led to changes at the policy-level:
 - Addition of a form on rights of children in the Motor Accident Claim Tribunal (MACT)
 - SOP for Enforcement of the Delhi Private Placement Agency (Regulation Order), 2014.

Individual Case Representation

Despite the pandemic induced challenges, when the district courts were not functional initially, and later courts took up matters listed for bail and urgent hearings, BBA provided legal aid to children which resulted in the following outcomes:

STRATEGIC PARTNERSHIPS

1. NITI AAYOG

The **Aspirational District Programme** (ADP) launched by the Government of India in January 2018 is an attempt to push for substantial growth across various socio-economic parameters in areas that remain distant from inclusive development. NITI AAYOG and BBA **engaged in an initial phase of discussions for collaboration** to support the initiative in 11 districts of Jharkhand and Bihar.

2. PARTNERSHIP WITH NCPCR

To combat the steep rise in trafficking of children and to make 10 districts of Bihar child trafficking free, NCPCR with the support of BBA started a programme titled- **“Mapping exercise of children and families vulnerable to child trafficking during COVID-19 times and identification of hotspot areas (source, transit and destination)”**. The objective of this collaboration was to prevent vulnerable children from trafficking and to ensure rehabilitation of rescued children. District level meetings were held to constitute a team to exclusively work towards the cause. Furthermore, a district-level consultation, as well as training of key government stakeholders was conducted with the support of NCPCR.

3. STAKEHOLDERS/DUTY BEARERS

BBA **collaborated with District Administration, SCPCRs, SLSAs and NGOs of 20 states'** which resulted in the successful arrangement and distribution of relief material during the pandemic. The partnership further helped BBA in capitalising the support for protection and rehabilitation of children.

4. HARYANA

MoU signed between SCPS of Government of Haryana and BBA for strengthening institutional framework and intensifying state mechanisms for protection, reintegration and rehabilitation of children.

5. KERALA

A. **MoU signed between Kerala Government and BBA:**

- To augment the skill and capacity of Kerala police cyber dome,
- To create a convergent ecosystem for strengthening protection and prosecution mechanism in POCSO Act, 2012.
- To ensure timely assistance and justice to the victim and his/her family.

B. On the recommendation of BBA, Government of Kerala **started online classes for differently-abled children.**

6. TELANGANA

- BBA's sustained advocacy with Telangana government authorities led to the **creation of a Juvenile Justice Fund of INR 1 crore**, exclusively focusing on expenditure involved in the welfare and rehabilitation of children.
- BBA was **nominated as a part of a High-Level Committee by SLSA Telangana** to oversee the JJ pendency and implementation of the Sampurna Behura Judgement.

7. Others

- **51 District Task Forces** (DTFs) against child labour activated in 7 states (Andhra Pradesh, Jharkhand, Punjab, Tamil Nadu, Telangana, Uttarakhand and Uttar Pradesh).
- Engaged with **166 Police Stations** of 10 states for creating **'Child-Friendly Corners'** (Andhra Pradesh, Bihar, Kerala, Karnataka, Punjab, Tamil Nadu, Telangana, Uttarakhand, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal).
- District Administration of Ranchi **flashed BBA's helpline number** for receiving complaints.
- An **SOP** was prepared with the Bureau of Police Research and Development **to deal with cases of trafficking during the pandemic.**
- An **action plan** was prepared **for protection of children from trafficking and child labour** with **National Disaster Management Authority.**
- Letters were written to Chief Secretaries of **20 states** (where BBA has direct presence) **regarding prevention of online child sexual abuse**, particularly during the Covid-19 lockdown.
- Letter was written to the **Ministry of Women and Child Development** for setting up and activating Childline in all the districts of India for addressing the **needs of children during the COVID-19 crisis** as a response mechanism.
- Communications were sent out to **DMs, SPs and DCPUs** across the country seeking statutory compensation, formation of VCPCs and migrant registers for curbing trafficking.
- **BBA made policy recommendations with regard to Private Placement Agencies Regulation Bill, 2020 to the Labour Department, Government of Delhi.**

TRAININGS AND WEBINARS

- A webinar was organised on the occasion of World Day against Trafficking in Persons (30 July 2020). 117 participants from various AHTUs across seven states and four state DGP Rank officers participated. The objective of the webinar was to build a road map based on the action points issued in the MHA advisory for combatting trafficking in their concerned states.
- Multiple webinars were organised to build the capacities of the staff and stakeholders.
- 93 online training sessions on child protection issues provided to over 45,000-district level LEAs, NGOs & school teachers.
- A webinar on 'online safety' was organised for associates of BBA on 2 October 2020 by a Cyber Security expert.
- BBA hosted an Indo- Nepal virtual consultation on Cross Border Trafficking of Children on 10 December 2020. The consultation saw the participation of over 250 people and 28 dignitaries from both the nations. The invited dignitaries were representatives of various government departments including SCPCR, CWC, LEAs and Members of Parliament. The consultation highlighted the issues and challenges related to cross border trafficking as well as rehabilitation of the rescued children. The consultation also focused on obtaining recommendations and suggestions from the participants for creating and developing child-centric policy addressing cross-border trafficking of children.



BBA COMBATS COVID-19 CRISIS

COVID-19 was a global public health crisis and had a major impact on world economies. The pandemic posed a threat to food security as well as grave risk to the survival of families of low-income and middle-income communities. The abrupt announcement of the lockdown rendered many jobless and homeless. As soon as the nationwide lockdown began, hordes of migrant workers left the cities and started an arduous journey back to their native places. Amongst the returnees, many were children who took to the roads and lost their lives on the way. Owing to such heart-rending incidents, Nobel Peace Laureate Kailash Satyarthi wrote to the Prime Minister to come to the aid of child labourers.

The pandemic exposed vulnerabilities of children in terms of their right to survival, development and protection. Closure of schools, limited or no access to healthcare facilities and other essential services aggravated the situation. This further increased the level of insecurity, poverty and marginalisation and pushed families into an economic crisis.

The vulnerability of poor households during pandemic was associated with a rise in the number of children who entered the labour market. The data also reveals that situation led to a surge in child trafficking and other forms of exploitation. Under these circumstances, BBA along with its partner organisation Kailash Satyarthi Children's Foundation, undertook a study titled 'Impact of Lockdown and Economic Disruption on Poor Rural Households with Special Reference to Children'. The findings of the study reported the expectation that cases of child labour and trafficking are likely to increase in the post pandemic period.

During this year, while the whole world was hit by the pandemic and most people were working from home, BBA however, did not halt its efforts towards ensuring children's protection from exploitation. The life-threatening nature of the pandemic failed to deter BBA from its commitment towards securing the rights of children.

BBA responded with country wide action by extensively engaging with government officials, partners and corporates in providing COVID-19 relief support to **over 4.9 million persons**. Access to food relief and linking vulnerable families with schemes introduced during the pandemic helped in preventing trafficking of children. The support provided was recognised by NITI Aayog, Government of India and various state governments. BBA's continuous intervention led to the rescue of **9446 children** who were trafficked during the lockdown. BBA's contribution to Covid-19 relief, prevention of trafficking and protection of children during Covid was duly appreciated by the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner.



COVID-19 RELIEF

During the challenges posed by the pandemic, BBA rose to the occasion and contributed to covid relief work. BBA actively engaged in the distribution of relief aid in the form of groceries, cooked meals and safety equipments, which in turn led to the fulfilment of basic needs of the marginalised.

'ACCESS TO FOOD DURING THE PANDEMIC PREVENTED RE-TRAFFICKING OF RESCUED CHILDREN'

BBA activists maintained constant communication with the previously rescued children throughout the year. Initially when movement was restricted, BBA telephonically followed up with the children. During one such phone follow-up, it was found that five children from Araria, Bihar were unable to meet their daily requirements due to loss of employment of their parents.

BBA's Bihar team immediately conveyed the information to the concerned authorities, letters were written to the District Administration regarding disbursement of statutory compensation and linkage of their families to social welfare schemes. The activist also assisted families of these children in submission of applications in order to avail the benefit of schemes introduced by the state government during the pandemic.

BBA reached out to several such children and their families across the country and extended food relief support. The support saved many vulnerable children being re-trafficked during the unprecedented times.

Empowered Groups have joined hands with government against Covid

Civil society, and voluntary and non-government organisations constitute the backbone of the collective articulation of citizen interest in a democracy. As facilitators, mediators, and advocates of this interest, they have put people before everything else during this crisis.

Everybody agrees that we are living through unprecedented times. The nature and scale of the crisis which the COVID-19 pandemic has led to is unparalleled. In such a scenario, solutions are unlikely to come from past experiences or best practices. The biggest source of strength now is the partnerships we have built over the years. The situation at hand calls for stakeholders to come together, work side by side and support each other. This is precisely what one of the Empowered Groups created by the government for comprehensive action and integrated response to contain the pandemic has been doing since it was formed.

The mandate of the group is to coordinate with three key stakeholders — NGOs, the private sector, and international development organisations — and help them in charting the best course of action. The fight against COVID-19 needed as many hands as were available. The job was too big for the government to handle alone. The strategy was to leverage vertical and horizontal partnerships: Vertical partnerships, which the stakeholders have built within their organisations and horizontal partnerships, which the government has institutionalised with stakeholders. The group itself is a partnership as its members are from eight different government ministries/organisations.

NITI AAYOG CEO acknowledges the work done by BBA during Covid-19.

Amitabh Kant, CEO of NITI Aayog, Government of India through a newspaper article mentioned the contributions made by NGOs and civil society organisations including Bachpan Bachao Andolan during the Covid-19 pandemic. He highlighted the impact it had on the lives of people belonging to the marginalised sections of the society.

NGO, Ludhiana RPF rescue 15 trafficked children from train

Police said the children were allegedly being brought from Bihar to Punjab to work as bonded labourers in factories as the state has been facing labour shortage due to an exodus of migrant workers which started during the lockdown.

A TEAM of Railway Protection Force (RPF) and NGO Bachpan Bachao Andolan (BBA) rescued at least 15 children, aged 12-17 years, who were allegedly trafficked from Bihar, from aboard a train late Thursday. An FIR was registered by Government Railway Police (GRP) against 12 persons who were accompanying the children and they have been arrested.

Police said the children were allegedly being brought from Bihar to Punjab to work as bonded labourers in factories as the state has been facing labour shortage due to an exodus of migrant workers which started during the lockdown.

Inspector Anil Kumar, RPF Ludhiana, said that a complaint was received on the Child Line helpline about the children being on board the Karambhoomi Express. A joint team of Bachpan Bachao Andolan and the RPF started checking the train and found some children and when the persons accompanying them were questioned, it was found that they were not their parents.

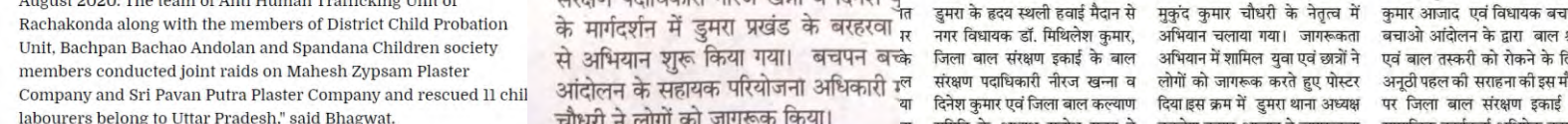
